
Introduction






10 possible situations when you have no smartphone available







Part 2

10 options to find a restaurant without a smartphone

1 Ask the good old clerk. At the hotel reception the crew always has several recommendations for good places to eat. They even have a map on paper from the area and they will kindly point your current location and two or three specific recommendations.

Sometimes the cities we visit have a restaurant area where you can walk and make your choice; it's likely you will be sent there. Some restaurants will ask to be recommended or will leave their business cards in a visible spot for you to notice when you check in.





2 Ask somebody on the street. Asking a person on the street is an emergency option. Some modern hotels do not have reception, well they do but it is an electronic device with a touch screen that after you write your code will spit a key for your room. Last time I used one it could not recommend any restaurant, may be in the future. Ask several people on the street, don't be shy.



Some might answer "sorry I'm not from this area", but others will be happy to recommend their preferred restaurant. If you are lucky they might even come with several options.



3 Take the risk walk down the street. I always try to book my hotel close to the downtown, it allows me to discover anew city and a little bit of its history. It also makes easier to find a restaurant, normally they are close to the central square or the cathedral. When I do that, I take care to look at the menu on the door, I check if the place is crowded or not, if the tables are nicely decorated and if people seems to be enjoying their meal. The risk of eating close to the downtown is to get food just good for tourists. I was disappointed several times and pleased some others. In any case I never starved.






4 Do your research before you leave. Have your meal plan on paper. The best measure is to cultivate the habit of planning in advance, if possible of course. Then if your smartphone is not available you will be happy to have a printed travel plan and just read to the taxi driver the address of the restaurant you had chosen online at the office or by asking someone before you left for the trip.






5 Ask the local sales people. This option is similar to that of planning in advance. Take the phone and ask your colleagues that know the area or work in that place to recommend where to go. We all have a couple of restaurants where we take customers or any kind of visitor. We also can recommend a special place which has not necessarily the usual format; it might be for example a food truck that makes the best Cuban sandwiches or Phò soup.






6 Le guide Michelin. Some colleagues I know travel with their guide in book format. Today they turned into aps and if you have no phone you have no guide. Anyway if you are still getting for example the Michelin guide or another of that kind you are served, just go to the list of recommendations for your area. Of course having a guide Michelin means you have a nice budget for dinners on a regular basis.





7 Ask your customer. Why not inviting the client for lunch or dinner, he will have to stand for his recommendation. Again, almost all customers have a special place to take suppliers or their own customers. In one occasion the customer I visited was the owner of the restaurant next door as well. He took his business partners there for lunch or dinner, the place was really good.






8 Gas Station, Pharmacy, Newspaper stand, other stores. The stores around you customer's facility are good sources of information, the guy at the gas station knows a place for sure, even the gas station might have some decent restaurant next to it. The newspaper stand is also a place to ask, the guy or lady in charge will for sure have a couple of tips for you, in many cases they have worked there for a long time.






9 The navigation system.

Going back to the electronics, if you rental car has a GPS just look in the options for restaurants and there you go, the system will show a list of the closest places. This is also very risky, normally there are no ratings and you have to take your chance. I have several times been guided to a restaurant that does not exist anymore but after a couple of rounds to the block you find a place to have your meal.





10 Ask the person sitting next to you in the plane. That person could be a local going back home or another business traveler that knowsthe city and can tell you a couple of names of restaurants to try.
